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RECOGNIZING ORDINARY HERITAGE **COMFORT IN ALL ITS STATES**



ANALYSIS COVERED ENTRANCES

The covered entrance is a recurring typology in the paris - jardin area. This transitional space sometimes belongs to the house, sometimes to the garden. In its current state, the difficulty of defining it is expressed by the way it is used. Sometimes simply the place to put a doormat, it can also be a storeroom or a small living room.

The aim is to list the different architectural treatments of these entrances, as well as their influence on house plans. Lastly, observing how they are appropriated by the inhabitants gives an indication of the development they could receive.





Bottom: perspective sketches of the uses of the covered entrances.










TRANSFORMATION
41 ALLEE DES DEUX CEDRES, DRAVEIL, FRANCE


The house is now home to a shared apartment for two people or couples.

The challenge on the ground floor is to reconnect with the garden. Originally, there were very few openings and the relationship with the garden was impermeable. The west wall was knocked down and a covered terrace built. Supported by large concrete posts, the structure frames views of the garden. The floor plan has been designed accordingly. Communal spaces are opened transversally, from the covered entrance to the garden. The result is large spaces that project into the flourishing environment of Paris - Jardins.

The first floor is reserved for private spaces. Each resident has his or her own bedroom, bathroom and study.

The large overhang of the terrace protects from the sun, which is particularly aggressive since this façade faces southwest. Inside, in addition to thermal renovation, the open plan design allows for significant air circulation. The roof features sarking insulation.





MUSIC AND DANCE


CONSERVATORY AT IVRY-SUR-SEINE


The aim is to propose a major new development for the town of Ivry-sur-Seine. A 3,000 m² art centre dedicated to musical creation and dance will be built next to the Parc des Cormailles.

The ground floor is open to all. A tree-lined courtyard welcomes the public and leads them to the main hall. Individual practice rooms are open to all in order to open up artistic practice as much as possible.


The music school is located on the upper floors, around the large central courtyard. The practice rooms are designed to provide the best possible acoustics. The walls are not parallel to avoid floating echoes, and the architectural elements are separated to prevent sound transmission between the rooms.


The performance spaces offer a wide range of possible presentations, from the most formal to the most free. The large auditorium, with a capacity of 400, has a classical, frontal layout. The amplified music auditorium is designed in the style of a club, with a standing capacity of over 600. Finally, the hall is transformed into a centrally-planned stage area.






Left:

PETITE CEINTURE

RUE FLORIAN, PARIS, FRANCE

The «petite ceinture», a former railroad line that encircles a large part of Paris, is already in many places a landscaped area for strolling and relaxing in a green environment. In its condition prior to intervention, this section of the petite ceinture in the 20th arrondissement is not very friendly. No access is provided, and barbed wire has been laid to prevent it. And yet, it is already a meeting place for local residents. Children play in the scaffolding, walkers venture out with their dogs, people come to graffiti, and in the evenings, raves are organised in the former station.

The aim here is to provide access that will enable everyone to enjoy the site.

To cross the five-meter height separating the street from the quay, three spaces are linked by a slope and a staircase. The absence of a low wall between the three levels formally connects them, allowing a general view.

One entrance is located on the first level, intended for the crossroads, while the other is higher up on Rue Florian, intended for students from the nearby secondary school. As you ascend through the levels, you'll find: a space connected to the city, with wide seating areas and a large boules pitch; another, greener space, which also contains a boules pitch and bleachers for taking a break and watching the game; and a final, freer space, like a public garden.


















OLD BARN SAINT MARCEL, 36200


A former agricultural barn is now home to a family of 4. As well as working on architectural projections, this exercise involved developing technical skills in creating digital images and designing a building permit.





ANALYSIS AND COMPUTER GRAPHICS OF HOMES


